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Message from the Dean

Academic year 2023-2024 found the College of Humanities and Fine Arts moving forward on many fronts. Our annual report highlights many of the positive teaching and learning events presented by the college.

Before we enter into those specifics, the faculty and staff of the college, who are the life-blood of our activities, are to be highlighted. Dr. James Humphreys (History) and Dr. Amanda Joyce (Psychology) were the college's Board of Regents Award for Teaching Excellence recipients. University Faculty Awards were presented to Dr. Juyoung Song (English and Philosophy) for the Distinguished Research Award, Dr. Megan Saint Peters (Psychology) for the Faculty Innovation Initiative Award;, and Dr. Michael Bordieri (Psychology) for the Stephen B. White Award.

The college awarded Dr. Brittany Wood (Political Science and Sociology) the Excellence in Teaching Award. Dr. Tamara Feinstein (History) received the CHFA Collegiate Research and Creativity Award. The award for Excellence in Service and Leadership was presented to Dr. Michael Bordieri. The college Mentoring Award was presented to Dr. Carrie Jerrell (English and Philosophy).

The college Staff Excellence Award was presented to Cheryl Hicks, Administrative Assistant II, in the Dean's office.

The college also presented two Outstanding Scholar Awards for 2023-2024 to students. Madison Johns received her degree from the Department of Art and Design in Graphic Design. Elise Eaton earned her bachelor's degree in History with Social Studies Teaching Certification. In the Fall of 2023, two of our college graduates were named MSU Outstanding Seniors: Syler Kennedy (B.S., Sociology with a minor in Legal Studies) and Kaid Marek (B.A., Psychology with a minor in Gender and Diversity Studies).

As you read through this annual report, you will find that each of our departments focuses on students through excellence in the classroom, scholarship and creative activity, performances, guest artists, guest speakers and lecturers, a film series, exhibitions in our galleries, and mentoring students for success following graduation. These endeavors have contributed to the growth of our student body, increased our student's success upon graduation (including an uptick in law school and graduate program acceptances) and provided successful internship candidates in areas around the country. Our programs are nationally accredited (when applicable) and our Graphic Design program has been named best in the Commonwealth two years in a row by an external review process.




CHFA Enrollment










Faculty in CHFA had a prolific year in research and creative activity, with over 160 presentations, performances, awards and appointments external to Murray State University.



Art & Design

Professor Scott Cook exhibited his work in *Positive/Negative 39* National Juried Art Exhibition at Slocumb Galleries at East Tennessee State University and was a visiting artist at the Holland College of Arts and Media's Micro-Fab Lab in Cape Girardeau, MO, where he also taught a workshop and gave a lecture.

Professor Lu Colby had a solo exhibition, *A Room of Her Own*, in Bill Ford Gallery at the Paducah School of Art & Design's 2D Graphic Design Building. She also gave an accompanying artist talk.

Dr. Antje Gamble published *Cold War American Exhibitions of Italian Art and Design* with Routledge. She also published a review of Caroline M. Riley's book, *MoMA Goes to Paris in 1938: Building and Politicizing American Art* in *Panorama: Journal of the Association of Historians of American Art* Dr. Gamble also served as the Juror Panelist for the 62nd annual Juried Art Exhibition at the Owensboro Museum of Fine Art in Owensboro, KY.

Professor Cintia Segovia Figueroa exhibited her work in *Infinite Weight / Present Histories:* The 2nd Annual Juried Photography Exhibition at the University of West Georgia, and Aperturas y Obstaculos at the Clemens Fine Arts Center. Professor Segovia Figueroa served as the juror for Art Through The Lens 2023_in Paducah, KY, and was part of a partnership grant for serving as moderator for three events for the Kentucky Arts Council during Celebrating the Art and Culture of Kentucky. She was also featured in an artist profile in the *Northern Kentucky Review*.

Two sonnets by **professor Pamela Parker** were chosen for inclusion in an anthology, *Thirty Poems in Thirty Days*. The anthology was released by Trio House Press at the Association of Writers and Writing Programs annual conference in spring 2024 and was used as a writing prompt source for National Poetry Month in April.

Dr. Rebecca Rosen received the Richard Beale Davis Prize for 2022–2023 from the Modern Language Association Forum on Early American Literature for her essay, "'The Voice of the Innocent Blood Cries Aloud from the Ground to Heaven': Speaking and Discovering Infanticide in the Early American Northeast."

Professor Kari Shemwell received a grant from the British Arts Council to attend a residency in Scotland to work on her novel.

Dr. Saihua Xia's article, "Chinese Students' Transcultural Strategies: Intentions to Navigate Identity Conflicts and Expand Their Identities Through Hong Kong Study Experiences" was published in the Journal of Comparative & International Higher Education.

Global Languages & Theatre Arts

Professor Matthew Crider was elected to co-chair the Southeastern Theatre Conference's movement and physical theatre committee. 










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Faculty in the Department of History published work in a number of academic venues this year.





Recruitment Events & Community Outreach



The College of Humanities and Fine Arts is the cultural hub of Murray, Kentucky. This is evident in the extensive list of events hosted by departments, partnerships with the community, and the frequency with which our faculty member's expertise is sought out by local new agencies. Below are a few examples of these partnerships and the impact it has on the Western Kentucky community.

- Dr. Rebecca Williams (Art & Design) worked with Debi Henry Danielson, Director of the Murray Art Guild, to apply for the "Arts for All" Kentucky-Side By Side Grant. Dr. Williams's students designed and taught classes as part of this grant and participated in the Murray Elementary School's Spring Swing by hosting a face painting booth.
- Professor Mike Martin (Art & Design) was elected president of the board of directors for the Murray Art Guild Community Art Center and assisted MAG in completing a Community Development Block Grant for the Purchase Area Development District. MAG was awarded \$750k for its new building development.
- Art & Design Professor Cintia Segovia Figueora's students photographed clothing pieces from Angel's Attic to promote the nonprofit on Facebook.
- Art & Design Professor Nicole Hand's advanced printmaking students exhibited their work at the Freight House restaurant in Paducah, KY. They exhibited 25 pieces and sold 17 pieces from the exhibition. The Freight House has asked for this to be an annual exhibition.
- The University Galleries hosted The Magic Silver Show, a juried exhibition featuring works of 80 different regional, national, and international artists. Artist and Curator Frances Jakubek served as the juror. The exhibition is sponsored by Dr. Constantine and Jo Curris in memory of their daughter, Elena.
- In addition to student exhibitions, the University Galleries hosted seven exhibitions and six visiting artist talks by regional and national artists. All exhibitions and lectures are open to the public.
- The Department of Art & Design hosted its annual Holiday Art Auction of artwork donated by faculty, students, community members, visiting artists, and alumni. Works are sold through both a silent and live auction as a way to raise money for Art & Design major scholarships. In Fall 2023, the event raised \$9,367.
- The Creative Writing program hosted three nationally acclaimed authors as part of the Murray State Reading Series. The authors gave craft talks to English majors and read from their work. The readings are free and open to the public.

- The Department of English & Philosophy hosted a professional development day for regional English teachers. The event included MSU faculty-led workshops, panels, and discussions on content and pedagogy applicable to high school classrooms, with the goal of supporting regional educators in their work, as well as strengthening the university's connections to the teachers and, by extension, their students.
- Kentucky Shakespeare's professional traveling company produced four performances of A
 Midsummer Night's Dream" for the 2024 Murray State Shakespeare Festival. Nine regional schools
 and over 700 students attended the festival, which also included a flash mob, movie screenings, a
 community reading at the Calloway County Public Library, an acting workshop, and book
 giveaway.
- The Department of English and Philosophy partnered with The Pride Center to host 2022 Kentucky Teacher of the Year and poet Willie Carver, author of *Gay Poems for Red States*, for a public reading.
- The CHFA Humanities Series hosted twelve events in 2023–2024 including screenings, lectures, panels, and a podcast listening event.




- The Department of History hosted its annual Easley Lecture and continued its community lecture series at the Calloway County Public Library. Both series are free and open to the public.
